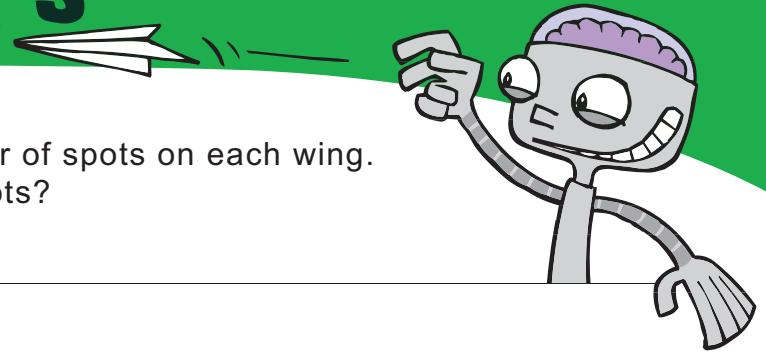


LADYBUG SPOTS



Ladybugs with spots have the same number of spots on each wing.
Can you make a ladybug with matching spots?

WHAT YOU'LL NEED

- A small paintbrush or cotton swab
- Paint (any color)
- Several printed copies of these activity sheets

WHAT TO DO

1 Paint some spots on one of the ladybug's wings.
You can find the ladybug on page 2 of this activity.

Before the paint dries, fold your paper in half along the dotted line, so the paint drops make matching spots on the other wing.



2 Try it again on another clean drawing of the ladybug. Can you make a ladybug with 6 spots total? How many spots should you paint on the first side to end up with 6 spots all together?

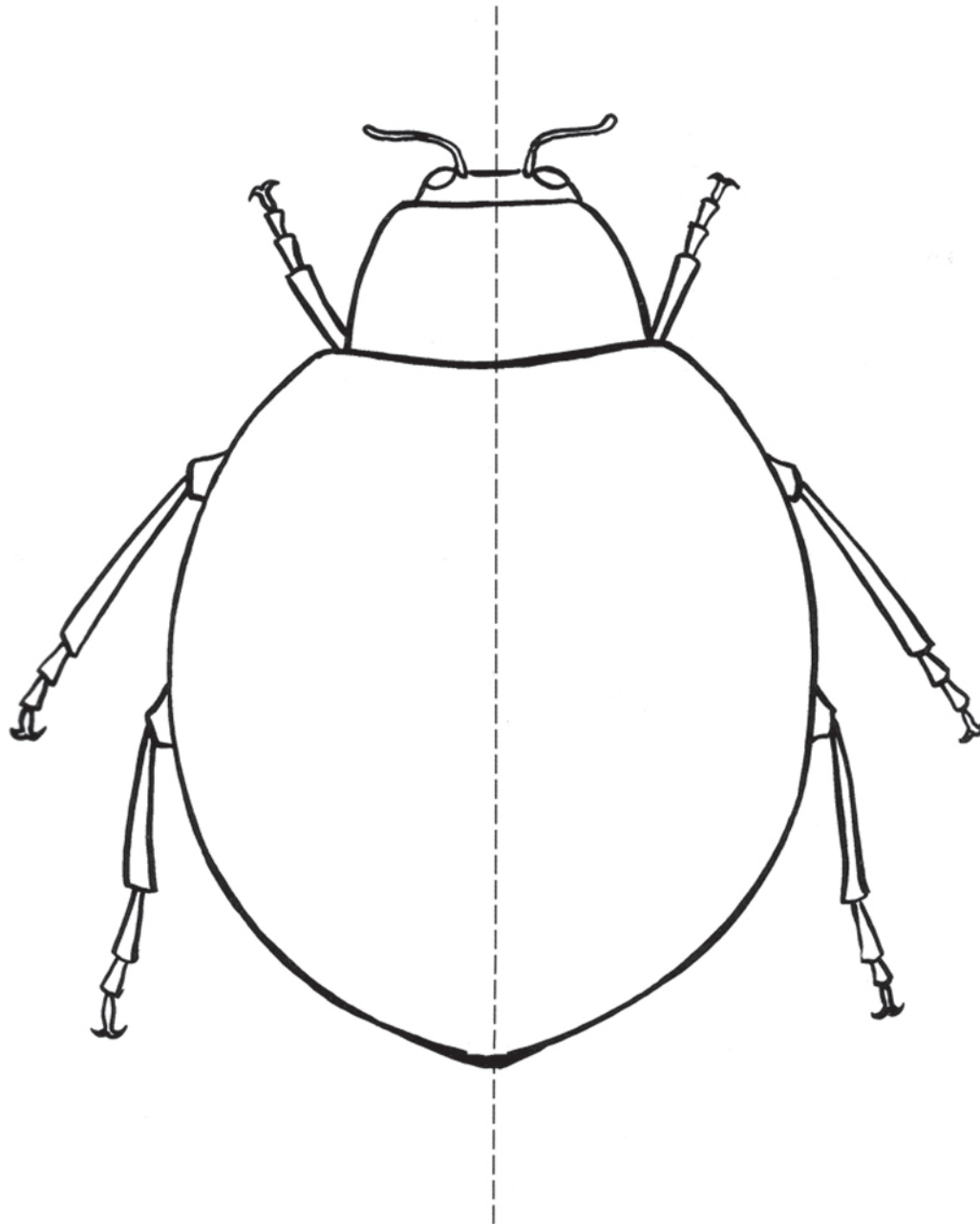

Paint some spots on one of the ladybug's wings here!

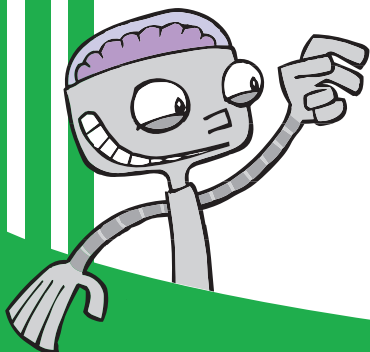


- 3** Draw a picture of yourself. Which parts are the same symmetrical on each side of your body?



DID YOU KNOW?

- Some ladybugs have only 2 spots on each wing, but some have 14 on each wing. Some have no spots at all!
- Not all ladybugs are red. Some are yellow with black spots, orange with yellow spots, or brown or black with white, red or yellow spots.
